

INTRODUCTION

Some children feel that David lived at the same time as Jesus. And if he didn't, what difference does it make? A LOT.

Welcome to *Bible Eras At-a-Glance*, an easy way to help children understand the path of Bible history.

All events in the Bible are building blocks. One builds on the next until, around 0 BC/AD, the Messiah arrives as the greatest hero of all! To be able to put Bible events—or at least the biggest ones—in order will tell incredible things about the nature of God, the nature of man, why we needed Christ, and how our world is affected by him today!

The Method Behind our Teaching

When children learn the Bible, the things they are most likely to relate to are the Bible heroes. And God arranged things in a very cool way. The biggest Bible heroes and the events surrounding them happen in 500-year increments. Learning Bible Eras is made simple by naming these six periods after their corresponding hero, such as we have:

1. Noah: 2500 BC
2. Abraham: 2000 BC
3. Moses: 1500 BC
4. David: 1000 BC
5. Great Exile: 500 BC
6. Jesus: 0 BC

Patterns in History & Our Use of Them

Human history via the Bible is so easy that it is intriguing! Human history started with a 2,000-year period, running from Adam to Abraham. It may end with a 2,000-year period, which runs from Christ to us. In the middle are 4 periods of 500 years each. The births of the most well-known characters start each one!

That's it! Biblical human history of 6,000 years at a glance is before you!

Please note that most all dates on our materials are estimates, including Christ's birth year.

However, the dates we have selected are accepted by Christian scholars, with variations on the early dates broadening. For example, one school of thought puts Abraham's birth 200 years later than we do, and differing dates of the Great Flood range several hundred years.

The reasons for the variations have to do with the early Jews using a different calendar than we do, as well as the concept of our overview, including BC and AD, being inconceivable to early chroniclers. Genesis 5 and 11 are genealogies, and it is obvious the chroniclers were trying to give every clue possible for future generations to gauge the passage of time. But estimates are still necessary.

However the 2,000/500/500/500/500/2,000 theory works with most all estimates! And it makes the overview of history quite easy to understand.

The system almost works like clockwork. You can see one period not named after one Bible hero: Period 5 is named after the Major & Minor Prophets—16 total. Many prophesied about the Great Exile that was coming or about the kingdoms' bad behavior that kept building toward it. Hence, the Era 5 timeline reaches back almost 300 years, to 800 BC, to capture the prophecies about the big event.

The system gives you a great chance of presenting history in a way that most kids will “get it.” If they can remember their favorite heroes in order: Noah, Abraham, Moses, David, [The Prophets] and Jesus, the Bible will suddenly make a lot of sense!

In the package, you will find all of this:

- A History of the Bible at a Glance Timeline that you could keep on your Sunday school classroom wall at all times to show children when their favorite heroes lived. It comes with its own worksheet.
- A Teacher's Answer Sheet will be provided that contains the answers on all worksheets.
- Plus, the following are included for each of the six eras:
- A text “cheat sheet” that gives the most important information students need to know;
- A color-coded timeline to help kids remember each period better, complete with some interesting information about that character or period. Each era's timeline is color-coded to match the History of the Bible at a Glance Timeline colors. Colors are another way to reinforce.

A worksheet where kids have to fill in the blanks—mostly by studying the timeline, but sometimes completing a Bible lookup. If there is a Bible lookup on the worksheet, use the New International Version (NIV) unless otherwise indicated.

Ways to Use this Package

There are so many ways to use Bible Eras At-a-Glance, and here are just some:

If you realize your students think the story happened recently, or around the time of Jesus (or didn't happen at all!), simply work with a cheat sheet and worksheet to get them understand much more about it.

If you want to do a series on understanding Bible history, you will be helping your students more than you realize. One thing that gives Christianity so much credibility is its historicity. Kids are taught to doubt their faith (in schools, almost systematically) and understanding that these events have actual time/placement makes them factual as well as interesting. What a faith-builder! Use the worksheets for reinforcements.

Teach Bible stories in enlightening new ways: Regardless of what you are teaching, these Bible Eras can shed more light on characters and situations.

Use the sheets for series interludes or for help on a slow day. Students can play games with the Bible verses, have lookup relays, or hold general discussions on what situations in their lives will benefit by the subject. The wealth of scriptures will prepare them for the week ahead and for the distant future as well!

What's Most Important

Your students need to understand their Bibles are true and not made up of myths. They need to know Jesus is historically relevant, as was King David 1,000 years earlier and Moses, 500 years before that! To make Bible history incredibly easy to place, let's get started now!



INTRO TO BIBLE ERAS: BIBLE HUMAN HISTORY AT A GLANCE

Approximate Dates: 4000 BC to 2000 AD (today)

Human history via the Bible is so easy that it is intriguing! Human history started with a 2,000-year period, running from Adam to Abraham. - 4000-2000 BC - Events surrounding NOAH and pre-recorded history
- 2000-1500 BC - Events starting with ABRAHAM
- 1500-1000 BC - Events starting with MOSES
- 1000-500 BC - Events starting with DAVID
- 500- 0 BC/AD - Events surrounding the GREAT PROPHETS
- 0-2000 AD - Events starting with JESUS

The Dates are Estimates

These dates and most dates in the Bible are estimates, including Christ's birth year. The actual dates may be 50 years or more off.

Why can't we know the actual dates? The variations have to do with the early Jews using a different calendar than we do. It has 360 days per year. Concepts such as our BC and AD would have been inconceivable to early chroniclers. It is obvious from genealogies, such as Genesis 5 and 11, the chroniclers were trying very hard to give every clue possible about the passing of time to future generations. But estimates are still necessary.


It's 2,000/500/500/500/500/2,000 plus a few names

In Brief Summary:

The most astonishing fact about Genesis 1-11 is that more time passed during that period than did in the remainder of the Old Testament! The period begins around 4000 BC with the creation of Adam and ends in 2166 BC with the birth of Abraham. That's nearly 2,000 years. The last book in the Old Testament to take place was actually Nehemiah, ending around 432 BC. Between the birth of Abraham and the end of Nehemiah, that's just over 1,700 years!

Before the Flood, people lived much longer. For example, Adam himself lived to be 930 years old. Recent evidence in quantum physics is causing some scientists to change their thinking about life being very, very old and the atmosphere having remained constant. One example is a theory having to do with Zero Point Energy (also known as ZPE). It shows that atomic processes, as well as the speed of light, are slowing down.

CLAIMS TO FAME:

During this era, all the events of the Bible shifted west—from around the Euphrates River (in modern-day Iraq) over to Canaan (later to become Israel).

In Brief Summary:

After Genesis 11 tells the story of the Tower of Babel, the rest of the chapter, on until the end of Genesis, concerns four generations of the same family. It is called the Era of the Patriarchs because the first three generations gave birth to the nation of Israel.

Genesis 11 thru 50 is so filled with stories that the above list is not complete! Abraham is told by God to move from his home in Ur (near the Euphrates River in Modern Day Iraq) to Canaan (where Israel would be established, and more than a 500-mile journey). He and Sarah detour into Egypt after reaching Canaan but eventually settle there. Sodom and Gomorrah are destroyed before the couple has children.

The time of the Patriarchs was not filled with miracles like the times of Moses to come. However, one great miracle was the birth of Isaac, when Abraham and Sarah were 100 and 90, respectively.

Abraham becomes the father of Isaac, who becomes the father of Jacob. It is Jacob who fathered 12 sons, for whom the 12 tribes of Israel were named.

Jacob's son Joseph, second to the youngest, was hated by his older siblings because their father favored him. They conspired to sell him to merchants traveling to Egypt, where he became enslaved. However, Joseph was blessed by God and became something akin to prime minister! He recognized his brothers and took them all in during a famine.

This is how the descendants of the Patriarchs of Israel came to be in Egypt at the start of Exodus.

The events starting with Moses cover the establishment of Israel as a nation. They begin with the Exodus around 1446. That lasted 40 years.

The Exodus was full of miracles like the parting of the Red Sea.

They move into the period of Joshua's army conquering parts of what would become Israel. There were still miracles but they slowed down. That lasted more than 50 years.

Then Israel had enough land to be considered a nation. They had judges. God was king. That lasted 300 years.

Why did God tell Israel's army to kill or drive out all the pagans they conquered?

Sounds mean! Even the army thought so. And so sometimes they let the pagans stay and hang out.

The pagans worshipped birds & wofls & dogs made out of silver & gold. (The silver & gold God made.) They worshipped the sun & stars & moon & even waves. (God made them, too.) The people of Israel could not resist this stuff. Their God was invisible. (Uh...maybe because he's was SO big and powerful?)

They got caught up in idols time after time. God got so grossed out and offended that he could hardly look, let alone help them much.

CLAIMS TO FAME:

This era, starting with Moses, contains one of only three periods in history that abounded in miracles. This period of miracles was the first of the three in the Bible.

It started with the Burning Bush in Exodus 3. It ended shortly after the sun stood still in the sky in Joshua 10. The miracles happened over an approximate 75-year span between approximately 1450 BC and 1375 BC.

The other two periods were the time of Elijah and Elisha, around 900 to 800 BC, or 500 years later, and the last one was during the time of Christ.

In Brief Summary:

The period before this, the Time of the Patriarchs, actually named the 12 tribes of Israel and positioned them to call on God for help while in Egypt. This period, the Establishment of Israel, covers their escape from Egypt, return to Abraham's Canaan, and their taking of that land by a combination of miracles and military might.

The Exodus lasted 40 years. During that time the people lived as nomads in the desert between Egypt in the south and Canaan above. Following the Exodus, Joshua led the army in conquering Israel's land for around 50 years.

The Book of Judges is a continuance of wars, but with judges in place (God was still considered king). This is one of the spots in the Bible where God was telling the people to either annihilate or drive out those whom they conquered. The problem was that God (1) knew these opponents worshipped other gods, (2) would not change their minds about these practices, (3) would eventually infest Israel with idolatry, and (4) would cut themselves off from his guidance and grace. The Israelites refused in many cases, and they ended up living side-by-side with the losers and adopting their practices.

There were 15 judges over 300 years. The most noteworthy ones were Deborah (Chapter 4), Gideon (Chapters 6-8), Jephthah (10:6-12:7), and Samson (Chapters 13-16). Some others got involved in the practice of idolatry.



In Brief Summary:

Because this Era sees a lot of changes, it sees a lot of action.

Kings Saul, David, and Solomon were the only three kings to serve a united kingdom. Beginning with Solomon's son Rehoboam, the kingdom splits in two over tax disputes. Ten of the tribes make up the Kingdom of Israel. Judah and Benjamin remain as the only two tribes in Judah. But Judah contains Jerusalem and the temple. Hence it was considered the more important of the two.

All 30 kings of Israel and most kings of Judah were evil, encouraging the people to worship idols and some even sacrificing their own children to idols. Hence, God allowed the Assyrians to invade the Northern Kingdom and the Babylonians to invade the Southern Kingdom. In the Northern invasion beginning around 732 BC, all 10 tribes were exiled abroad and are still "lost." They got absorbed into the population. In the Southern invasion, beginning in 586 BC, all the people were taken to Babylon, but after 70 years, they were allowed to return.



During this era, King Cyrus, King of Persia, was inspired by God to set the captives free from the Babylonian exile and finance the rebuilding of the temple. Isaiah prophesied about him by name 150 years earlier.

The minor prophet Haggai was chronicled during this period. He is the only great prophet to speak to God's people in the present about the present time. He also gave one of the few prophecies that God's people listened to.

In Brief Summary:

The big event of this period was Babylon invading the Kingdom of Judah. They destroyed the Temple and took almost all the people away in exile to Babylon. The people returned and rebuilt the temple 70 years later. This happened in the 500s BC.

This era is named after the Great Prophets, meaning all 16 prophets in our Bible who have their own books. There are 12 minor prophets and 4 major prophets, as noted on the timeline.

The prophets actually began prophesying several hundred years before the events happened. Hence, the timeline goes back into the 700s BC.

In Brief Summary:

As well, there was another big invasion and exile before the Babylonian invasion. Reaching back 150 years, the Assyrians invaded the Kingdom of Israel and exiled all those people. As there were 10 tribes of Israel in the kingdom who never returned, that created what is known as the “lost tribes of Israel.”

To end the Great Exile in the 500s BC, the king of Persia, King Cyrus, invaded Babylon, killed King Nebuchadnezzar, released the Jews, and financed the rebuilding of their temple.

This is the very temple Jesus would preach in 500 years later.

The Books Ezra, Nehemiah, and those of several prophets were written after the Great Exile. The Book of Nehemiah ends around 432 BC and is the last book written about Old Testament history. Malachi was the last prophet, who prophesied around 465 BC.

The Acts of the Apostles ends very suddenly. It ends with Paul's shipwreck in Malta. All the disciples were still alive except James, John's brother. He had been martyred in Jerusalem around 40 AD. All the other disciples eventually were martyred (died for their cause) except John. He lived to be an old man and died of natural causes, shortly after he wrote Revelation.

In Brief Summary:

Each gospel covers the life of Christ but in different ways.

The Gospel of Matthew was written for Jewish people. Hence it is full of references to Old Testament prophecy that are reflected in Christ's life. Matthew was a tax collector who became a disciple.

The Gospel of Mark was written by a close friend of the Apostle Peter and is thought by some to be Peter's memoir of his years with his Savior.

The Gospel of Luke is the only gospel written by a Gentile. Luke was quite educated and accompanied Apostle Paul on part of one missionary journey.

The Gospel of John is written by the Apostle, who also was one of Jesus' closest disciples. It is often thought of as the first book Christians should read because of the intimate ways it establishes Jesus as the Son of God.

The Acts of the Apostles also was written by Luke. It ends before Paul or Peter were martyred, however it is thought that Paul was martyred shortly thereafter.

The gospels and Acts are followed by the 13 epistles written by Apostle Paul: Romans through Philemon. Paul's works are followed by the Book of Hebrews, which some scholars feel that Paul also wrote. These are followed by seven more epistles written by others close to Christ, including Apostles Peter and John, and Jesus' half-brothers James and Jude.

Revelation was written by John the Apostle as his fifth book in the New Testament. It is considered the only apocalyptic book in the New Testament. Apocalyptic means having to do with the end of time or the Second Coming of Christ. Revelation matches up with things in Old Testament apocalyptic books including Daniel, Ezekiel, and Zephaniah.
